December 14th Meeting Notes

- Pastor Amy led devotions comparing the four Gospels, which narrate the story of the Nativity. Matthew emphasizes that Jesus is the Jewish Messiah, who fulfilled the prophecies and whom Wise Men came to worship. Mark only contains one line concerning the birth of Christ. In Luke, the simple birthplace of Jesus and the angel appearing to the lowly shepherds emphasizes the kindness and giving nature of the Messiah, who shares His love with all God's children. John's Gospel emphasizes Jesus as Creator of the Universe who brings His light into the world. All are combined into our telling of the Nativity in order to explain the magnitude of who Jesus is and what He brought to this world on the wonderful day of His birth.
- Food Pantry welcomed Kristen Cullen as the new director on the first of December. The dedicated volunteers provided 9,150 meals in November, including over 200 Thanksgiving dinners!
- Treasurer's November report: Total YTD revenue: \$211,350.65. Total YTD expenses: \$289,475. The Operating Fund is very low at this time of year. We hope more pledges arrive in December.
- Deacons have designated the remainder of the 2021 Mission budget. An additional gift of \$3,000 will be sent to Renew San Diego. Deacons' Christmas Offering: \$2250 received went to Gift of Hope.
- Property Committee updates: -B&L Property Management will provide snow removal and lawn care for the church property. -Goldinson glass will replace/repair ten windows in the Education building.

January 18, 2022, Meeting Notes

- Pia Price led devotions based on Matthew 13 (parable of the sower). Sunday School teacher, "Miss Pia" now sees this in a new light: the seed is the Word of God and Pia is the sower, slipping seed in whenever she can, trusting God to make it grow. God is the wonderful giver of gifts. We are receivers of those endless gifts and wisdom.
- Welcome new members: Elders Heather Hansen & John Twohig; Deacons Jeanne Devine & Greg Totino.
- The Food Pantry provided 8,055 meals and 90+ Shoprite gift cards in December.
- Treasurer's and Financial Committee's December report: Total YTD revenue: \$228,222.85. Total YTD expenses: \$328,939.74. Congregational giving in December was down considerably, and the usual significant end-of-year contributions did not appear. Boiler repair, snow removal, and special events added to 2021 usual expenses.

Pledges for 2022 down \$20,000 from 2021. The 2022 budget is based on pledges received through the pledge drive. Our ability to carry out the mission and ministries of our church depend upon the congregation's and community's financial support and the hard work and dedication of our members. Despite the pandemic bringing with it a good deal of uncertainty and challenges, we know that we will continue to meet our financial challenges and do God's work together with your support.

- Annual Congregational Meeting is being planned for March, pending any new Covid issues. The Annual Meeting will provide the opportunity to have the congregation ask questions and let their feelings and opinions be heard regarding dual affiliation with the United Church of Christ.
- Youth Group and Confirmation plans were suspended during January and will remain so through February, but will resume when in-person church services resume, hopefully in March.

Property Committee updates:

We are awaiting scheduling for the repair and installation of 10 windows in the Education building and the installation of crash bars on the doors in the Sanctuary.

Requirements for a new stove in the Ed building are being discussed with the Activities Committee. The Village and EZ Flow will assist with the repair of the Horse Stage Stop in front of the Sanctuary early this year. We are awaiting a proposal from EPDM to repair the leaking Sanctuary Yankee Gutters. R&G Wrought Iron Railing is being contacted to paint and repair the graveyard wrought iron fence. Some maintenance is needed for the Parsonage's deck, gutters, and bathroom.

• We are working on improving communications via our website and social media to notify the Congregation when Sunday services are canceled due to weather conditions. A new plan will be implemented in the next few days, and the congregation and staff will be notified.



A reminder of where the church spends money is critical at this time. Running a church like ours is no simple task. Over 60% of our expenses are to pay the people we employee (pastor, organist, secretary, and choir director). Although the Food Pantry Director works for the church and her salary is included in our budget, the Food Pantry reimburses the church for all costs related to that position so it does not come out of the General Fund. Property maintenance, which includes the

cleaning service, accounts for 20% of the budget. Support for our Classis, Synod, and missions account for another 9% of the budget. This leaves about 10% of the budget for us to maneuver when it comes to keeping things in order.

Special one-time costs such as those we encountered related to Covid (sanitizer stations, automatic paper towel and soap dispensers, air purifiers, extra cleaning, and equipment to enable us to stream our services) are quite reasonably addressed from our investments. These are emergency needs, and that is why we have this money. We are dependent on our congregation to cover most of these costs. Your pledges are important! You meeting your pledges is critical!

Girl Scout Project Benefits Children of Food Pantry Clients



<u>Jeremy and Susan Beebout</u> - Jeremy is an agronomist working with agricultural development efforts and Susan is a doctor developing the church's health ministries in Niger, Africa, one of the poorest countries in the world.



The focus of the CADR in 2021 was opening Polyclinique Dutsin Ceto. From the time that Clinique Olivia opened in 2012, CADR anticipated opening other clinics in rural areas. Construction on the second clinic began in 2017 and culminated with the successful inauguration and opening of the clinic in March of 2021. Jeremy was instrumental in the construction and human resource aspects. Susan helped with training health care professionals for the clinic and in ordering equipment, medication, and consumables. The majority of the rest of the year was spent preparing the ministries for our absence due to our planned home assignment. The inauguration of Clinic Dutsin Ceto was a very exciting moment for us and CADR. This was not only because it marked the transition between the construction phase and the beginning of operations,

but also because of the excitement and support of the community, which was evident in testimonies during the inauguration ceremony. There were many officials from the local, regional, and national government as well as the Christian community present to show their support for the opening of this clinic. A second event that took place shortly before our departure for home assignment was a vision-sharing meeting with leaders of the EERN. This was a key meeting for several reasons. Meetings between the EERN leaders and CADR have been infrequent and this provided a moment to come together and share. Secondly, there was a very positive atmosphere that dominated these meetings and one of the primary themes was how to better address sharing the love of Christ with our patients in our clinics.

In addition to the logistical problems we faced in opening the new clinic, home assignment presented its challenges. Our oldest daughter, Lydia, graduated from Sahel Academy here in Niger and began university this fall in the U.S. at the University of Northern Iowa. This has been a time of many transitions for Lydia.



opportunity to build new relationships in an unfamiliar culture to her and her first time feeling the freedom and weight of independence to name a few!

Another challenge we faced, which was not unfamiliar but is unique each time, was the transition for us from ministry in Niger to home assignment in the U.S. This transition brings very different routines, roles, and responsibilities. On home assignment, we are presenters, home school teachers, travelers, ambassadors, advocates, etc. Our children go from school in the classroom to home school. For Eliza, a junior, online classes presented an extra challenge as she traveled with us many miles but often lacked internet during travel. We entered into home assignment not sure what COVID would permit us to do regarding visits to supporters, but we thank God that it affected our overall schedule quite minimally.

Hopes for 2022

• We look forward to seeing how the CADR and the EERN can better partner to reach Muslims with the good news of the gospel through the clinics and nursing school.

• We hope to work closely with CADR leadership to improve sustainability, particularly in the areas of finance and human resources.

• We eagerly anticipate the first graduates from the EERN University, HESPerance. The nurses will be in high demand both at our clinics and elsewhere. •

• We need short- and long-term volunteers in the areas of nursing education, English as a second language, physical therapy, small construction and maintenance, and teachers at Sahel Academy.

• Construction at Polyclinique Dutsinceto will advance as finances permit with an emphasis initially on an imaging block and then, in the long term, a maternity block.

Anthony Musso, local historian and author, wrote an article for the January 5th "Poughkeepsie Journal" entitled "**Fishkill food pantry was a boarding school 200 years ago."** He received much of his information from our Historian Toni Houston and Historian Emeritus Willa Skinner.

The boarding school was established in 1805 by First Reformed Church of Fishkill's Pastor, Dr. Cornelius Westbrook, who served as the school's principal. You can see his picture hanging in the DuBois House parlor. The land was "glebe" property, land available to the pastor to reside on and farm to supplement his income. It had in the past been leased to Thomas Lawrence, who built a house on the corner of Main and Church, where our Education building now stands. When the church bought its lease back from Lawrence, the house became the parsonage for Rev. Westbrook. North of the parsonage was a small building used for the girls' cramped quarters dormitory. The furnishings were sparse and dessert was never on the minimal menu. The 15 girls shared a single bowl and pitcher to wash. The boys' dorm was built north of the girls' and was a 2 story building. The students excelled and many went on to Rutgers, Princeton, Union and Yale colleges. The school here operated until 1853, At which time it was relocated to New Jersey.

After Dr. Westbrook left the school, his school property lease was sold to his nephew and church member William Rapalje. Following William's death, his brother Richard acquired the lease and relocated the girls' dorm house to the northwest corner of Rt. 52 and Rapalje Rd. The charming little house with white fence still stands at that location. Subsequently, our church built in its place the chapel which was eventually replaced by our current Education building.



A larger academy building had been erected north of the former boy's dorm on the portion of the property (now housing our Fishkill Food Pantry). The academy building was converted into an apartment building, which was eventually demolished in 1967. The current building was built as an ice cream shop, later housed a restaurant, and now houses the Fishkill Food Pantry.
