Happy Spring!

For this month's issue, I'd like to share a devotion adapted from one that Deacon Greg Totino used in our most recent Consistory meeting. I hope you find it as meaningful as we did!

(Based on Luke 9:23-27)

In a world of uncertainty, it's natural to look for something solid and stable, something that will help us regain our footing when everything else seems upside down. When Jesus tells Simon, "You are Peter, and on this rock, I shall build my church," his meaning seems clear, the church is built upon the constant, unwavering love of Christ.

In the space of just a few verses, however, we are reminded of the uncertainty of our world. Christ's human journey was ended by human hands as the elders, and chief priests saw to his suffering and death. How shocking it feels to be promised, in one moment, the eternal promise of a church against which no evil can stand and in the next that the Son of Man will be killed by other men. Like Peter, we rebuke the harsh reality of death and say, "No, Lord, this must not happen!" And Jesus reminds us of our humanity. We do not have in mind the things of God but the things of humanity.

There is very little in our news or media that isn't a concern of humanity. When the world is uncertain, we look for something solid and stable while also looking to better ourselves. It is our nature to do this, but our betterment comes at a cost to our planet, fellow human beings, and souls. The bible says, "But what shall it profit a person if they gain the entire world and forfeit their soul?

In a country that has built itself on competition and a race to accumulate wealth, where we seek every avenue to success, this message hits us in the gut. We are eager to buy the latest luxury car even if it pumps toxic fumes into the air. We are eager to acquire the latest electronic device even if the factory where it is made relies on child labor or operates in a country where there is no understanding of "human rights." We seek our security and superiority even if it means building sociological or physical walls between ourselves and those we are told to be better than.

Today's news is filled with the horrible conflict in Ukraine, and the tragedy humanity can inflict upon itself in the pursuit of superiority. But what shall it profit them? What about our friends and neighbors whose only response is to complain about the price of gas? Those who would equate material loss with the destruction of countless lives? What can a person give in exchange for their soul?

What of the innocent civilians whose lives have been lost? The millions who have been forced to flee the country? They could use a rock to stand on. Today, let's pray for them.

Our Consistory at Work Consistory Meeting Notes from March 15, 2022

- Greg Totino led devotions based on Matthew16 and beautifully shared them with you on the cover of this PV.
- The drive-through distribution of ashes on Ash Wednesday blessed over 200 people! The opportunity to share this special day with so many thankful strangers and friends was a wonderful experience that will definitely be repeated next year! The Stations of the Cross study with Pastor Amy on Zoom has also made this Lenten season more meaningful to those who are participating in its unique approach to examining the road to the cross.
- The Food Pantry provided 7,110 meals in February. Welcome to the 11 new volunteers making additional openings on alternate Saturdays possible. Thanks to Paula for managing the Facebook page and developing new FP brochures. Thanks to Town Supervisor Ozzie Albra and Councilman John Forman for their support and to Town Councilman Brian Wrye for spearheading the development of the new community service initiative, "Fishkill Serves," joining the Town of Fishkill, Hudson Valley Renegades, and the Fishkill Little League to benefit our Food Pantry.
- Treasurer's and Financial Committee's February report: Total YTD revenue: \$36,141.98. Total YTD expenses: \$51,671.99. February giving was significantly low; Operating Fund shows a negative balance of \$15,530. Earnings from Investments are showing an expected decline.
- Christian Education news: In-person Sunday School begins April 10th, with no Zoom classes for the remainder of the school year. Welcome, Lisa Skorewicz and Michael Melichar, to our teaching staff! Sunday School will not be held on April 3, 17 (Easter), and May 1. It will end on May 22. Children will participate in the Palm Sunday service again, waving palms! Plans are in the works for outdoor Easter events with children.
- Property Committee updates Repair/ installation of the Educ. Bldg. windows complete. We're waiting for a date for installing the crash bars on sanctuary doors. Replacement of stove in DuBois house being looked into. A contractor will give us a quote to repair the sanctuary's leaking gutters. Steeple shingles due to be restained to prolong longevity. Scout William will begin his Eagle Scout project of building a mini food pantry at Trinity Church!
- Food bags, personal care items, warm coats, and clothing have been distributed to those in need by SDCH. The plan to supply a shower van for the homeless is taking shape; volunteers are stepping up, and Hudson River Housing is interested in sharing the cost and use of the van.
- The Easter Offering will go to Ukraine relief efforts. (see "Deacon's Easter Offering").

THE LEGEND OF THE DOGWOOD TREE


The Dogwood tree is a beautiful little tree with graceful white blossoms in the spring. The legend tells us that the tree was once very large, like a big oak tree. Its wood was strong and sturdy and was used as a building material for many different things. According to legend, it was the dogwood tree that provided the wood used to build the cross on which Jesus was crucified. Because of that, God both cursed and blessed the tree. It was cursed to be forever small, so its wood could never again be large enough to be used as a cross for a crucifixion. Its branches would be narrow and crooked so that it would not work for building at all.

The tree was also blessed so that it would produce beautiful flowers each spring in time for Easter. To remember God's promise to the tree, it is said he gave it a few traits so that whoever looks upon it will never forget:

- the petals of the dogwood actually form the shape of a cross; the blooms of the tree always have four petals.
- the middle of the Dogwood flower has a tight grouping of stamens resembling a "crown of thorns."
- the tips of the petals are indented as if they bear a nail dent.
- reddish colors in the petals resemble drops of blood that spilled during the crucifixion.

Earth Day 2022 "Invest in Our Planet"

The earth is the LORD's, and all its fullness; the world and those who dwell therein. Psalm 24:1.

When we look around us and watch the news, we see evidence of human-caused damage to our area and our world. While some issues are due to overpopulation, both need-based and greed-based consumption by humans contributes significantly to the destruction of our beautiful planet. The 2022 Earth Day theme is based on an initiative for people from all cross-sections of life to join forces – working together to reverse the damage caused by the way we have been living. It challenges businesses, governments, and individuals to combine forces and support each other in earth-saving efforts.

There are things big and small that we as individuals can do to help reverse current destructive planet-altering trends. The collective efforts of individuals (like you and me) and organizations can make a huge difference in our beautiful world. We should already realize the causes (deforestation, carbon emissions, unprecedented meat consumption, chemical, and medical wastes, etc.) and effects (global warming, ocean pollution, coral reef destruction, famine, extinction of animal species, catastrophic wildfires, and weather events, melting glaciers causing rising sea levels threatening coastal communities and nations).

Though the problems seem insurmountable, they are not irreversible. We are told that there is still time to save our precious planet – our gift from God – if we take action now. We still have an opportunity to preserve the future of our earth for our children and grandchildren.

To help you get started, printed below is a checklist of things you can begin to do:

- 1. Limit the use of single-use plastic
- 2. Purchase more seasonal produce
- 3. Purchase more locally produced goods
- 4. Reduce your air travel
- 5. Reduce the number of new products and goods you buy
- 6. Choose brands that have environmentally sustainable practices/values.
- 7. Choose brands that have ethical practices/values.
- 8. Reduce consumption of meat/animal products.
- 9. Stop purchasing certain brands of products due to your ethical or sustainability-related concerns about them.
- 10. Opt for low carbon emission and/or shared modes of transport.
- 11. Switch to renewable energy sources/products.
- 12. Change some or all personal financial investments for more ethical or sustainability-related investments options.
- 13. Contact a brand to raise an issue on their sustainability or ethical practices/values.
