Jesus Christ...what did he do?

I wrote that nearly 55 years ago; an angry, arrogant young man. I demanded to know what Jesus had done to deserve this fate, thinking that the mistreatment and death sentence had to be logically accompanied by crimes and guilt. I angrily asked, "what did he do?" within that context. How arrogant of me to think that Jesus needed a defense lawyer; that He needed me to defend him.

I was new to this social justice thing, and here I was, so self-centered, so self-assured, demanding justice for Jesus, ready to come to his defense.

I had read the Gospels, heard the Passion story, but still did not understand the "Good News." I asked "what did he do?" in the wrong context, and for years received no satisfactory answer. But the question was not the problem.

Now when I ask the question in the context of why, of Jesus' purpose, of His life and most especially his death, I receive a different answer. What did he do? He gave himself up, willingly, to pay for our sins, that we would be saved and receive eternal life.

Jesus wasn't a victim, he was the sacrifice. He didn't need a lawyer, he wanted a follower, a believer. It had to be this way, for without Jesus' death, there is no Easter. His death had to be this way, and neither I nor anyone else can alter this.

Your Consistory at Work Consistory Notes from April 2022

- The Food Pantry provided 8,775 meals in March. We are fortunate to have 6 Spanish-speaking volunteers available to meet our clients' needs. New volunteers are being recruited to expand the FP hours on Wednesday from 2:30 to 7:00.
- Treasurer's and Financial Committee's March report: Total YTD revenue: \$54,443.05. Total YTD expenses: \$80,329.54. Congregational giving for March was only 66% of the pledged total. We are still seeking volunteers with computer skills who can assist in counting Sunday offerings.
- Earnings from Investments are showing an expected decline due to conflicts in eastern Europe and inflation rising out of skyrocketing energy costs. Our transferable cash reserves ensure against market setbacks in this time of volatility.
- The special offerings at Eastertime for the people of Ukraine will be matched 3 to 1 from Missions from Bequests.
- Kate Valdivia has resigned her position as Choir Director to explore other employment options that fit her family's needs. We are so very grateful for the time and effort that Kate has given us and for the beautiful music and song with which she has filled the sanctuary and our spirits!
- In-person Sunday School has resumed and will continue until May 22nd. A student has been awarded a scholarship to attend Camp Warwick for one week this summer. Please contact Karen MacLeod if your child might be interested in this opportunity for spiritual growth and summer fun!
- Property Committee updates: Taggart Lake has contacted us offering to repair cemetery stones on the church property. The Memorial Garden (and the Twohigs who take care of it) will receive help in keeping the weeds at bay with edging installed by a landscaper and paid for by The Memorial Garden Fund.
- According to the recommended ten-year schedule, Roy Carruthers has been in touch with Robert Morgan, who previously worked on the steeple, to stain its shingles.
- Other pending projects: repairing the sanctuary's leaking Yankee Gutters (awaiting a quote); replacing the Education Building stove: repairing/replacing the back porch, ramp, and front steps of DuBois house; fixing the carriage mounting block; taking care of some maintenance work at the parsonage; painting the graveyard wrought iron fences.



A reminder of where the church spends money is critical at this time. Running a church like ours is no simple task. Over 60% of our expenses are to pay the people we employ (pastor, organist, secretary, and choir director). This year our budget has also added a paid position for Food Pantry Director. Although she legally works for the church and is included in our budget, the Food Pantry reimburses the church for all costs related to that position. Property maintenance, which includes the cleaning service, accounts for another 20% of the budget. Support for our Classis, Synod, and missions account for another 9% of the budget. This leaves about 10% of the budget for us to maneuver when keeping things in order. What can we do without?

Telephone? Copier? Christian Education? Music?

Special one-time costs such as those we encountered related to Covid (sanitizer stations, automatic paper towel and soap dispensers, air purifiers, extra cleaning, and equipment to enable us to stream our services) are quite reasonably addressed from our investments. These are emergency needs, and that is why we have this money. We are dependent on our congregation to cover most of these costs. Your pledges are important! You meeting your commitments is critical!



The Deacon's Easter Offering

As of April 28th, we have received \$10,335.00 for Ukraine relief, including \$7985 from the original Ukraine offering collection plus \$2370 from the Easter offering collection. This will be matched three to one from Missions from Bequests for a total of \$41,420. This amount may go up further. We will give 50% each to the Presbyterian Church's Disaster Assistance's Ukraine Emergency Appeal and United Church of Christ's Ukraine Emergency Appeal.


