

Meeting Notes from August 9, 2022

- Jeanne Devine led devotions based on Psalm 38:9-12 and 17-22. In times of global, national, and local turmoil we may feel anguish and loneliness...but God is there, ready and listening, to shoulder our burdens. As we send our lamentations to Him, we are expressing an act of faith, showing that we acknowledge that God can help us. God hears us, handles our questions, anger and doubt. He is always there...we are not alone.
- The Food Pantry provided 8,340 meals in May and 8,475 in June. The many events in which the FP has been involved (Food Drives, the Senior Picnic, the Stormville Flea Market, and partnership with Fishkill Serves) have been very successful in raising both awareness and funding for this wonderful mission! Pastor Amy will be the temporary replacement for Victor Chao as he steps down from the role of FP liaison to Consistory. Thank you for your time and effort, Victor!
- Treasurer's June report: Total YTD revenue: \$119,463.97; Total YTD expenses: \$169,573.45
- Finance Report: Offerings continue to be a concern.
- Following the market, earnings from Investments are showing a significant decline.
- Help with counting Sunday offerings and entering the information on the computer after the service is very much needed. We have a limited number of volunteers who are doing this and they would be more than happy to train a few additional helpers!
- The Everything Sale will be combined with Community Fun Day this year on September 17th for a day of indoor and outdoor fellowship, food, fun and shopping. More details to come!
- Property Committee updates:
- -We are reviewing options from the second contractor who was chosen to install the crash bars on the sanctuary doors and also considering a different landscaper to make improvements on the Memorial Garden.
- -The estimate for staining the shingles on the steeple is substantially higher than expected and is under review.
- The final cost of repairing the cemetery headstones will not exceed \$3,000. Toni and Claire Houston have been working on identifying and marking the graves of soldiers with flags.
- -The Mini Food Pantry at Trinity Church has been completed. Many thanks to Eagle Scout William Gwinn for choosing this worthwhile project and for the assistance contributed by Ray VanVoorhis that helped make it happen!

From the Investment Committee: Tithing / gifting from your IRA

If you have a traditional Individual Retirement Account (IRA), you must make annual withdrawals once you reach age 70 1/2 (or 72 if born after June 1949). These withdrawals are called Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) since the IRS requires them and they must be at least the amount determined by an IRS table, given your age and size of your IRA. Not withdrawing at least the required amount each year results in a heavy penalty. IRA withdrawals are taxed as ordinary income, may push you into a higher tax bracket, and may affect the taxes you pay on Social Security or Medicare. **Some tax can be avoided by taking advantage of a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD).** A QCD is an IRA withdrawal payable directly to an organization that accepts tax deductible contributions. It can be any amount; it can be more or less than your Required Minimum Distribution. For example, if you direct \$1000 from your IRA to be payable to the Church as your gift, it counts towards your Required Minimum Distribution but does not count as income, and you won't pay tax on it. The bank or broker that holds your IRA can help with their process for a Qualified Charitable Distribution. The key is that the IRA check must be made out to the Church – not to you – to avoid taxes. Please consult your financial or tax advisor. Please be sure to let depositing treasurer John Houston know that your payment will be forthcoming. For safety's sake, donor names are not always listed on IRA checks.
